In June, we said goodbye to an extraordinary class of 8th graders, whose exemplary leadership inspired us throughout the year as they paired with younger buddies, collaborated on ideas for school-wide events, and spoke beautifully of their time at Park Century during graduation. Service Learning

Park Century School places a high value on each student becoming an active community member. We want our students to understand that they share a responsibility with the world around them, and that by building awareness and working together, they can achieve larger common goals. By pairing curriculum-based learning and active community service, students participate in a variety of service-learning endeavors throughout the year.

During the 2017-18 school year, Park Century School partnered with the Westside Children's Center, Heal the Bay, and the Westside Food Bank for service-learning and discussed these organizations and opportunities during Panther Packs. In addition, the Park Century community also supported Operation Gratitude, Upward Bound House's Adopt-a-Family Program, and Miriam House, among other worthy organizations.









Grandparents and Special Friends Day

In March, Park Century celebrated our beloved tradition of Grandparents and Special Friends Day. After breakfast for our special guests, students performed a musical showcase featuring both choral and instrumental performances. Students then had the opportunity to guide their guests through a school-wide art show and take them to their classroom to share all of their hard work with their closest family and friends! One of the most special days at PCS, Grandparents and Special Friends Day is a chance for our students to celebrate the culmination of all of their creative and educational efforts!





















Visual Arts

At the core of the Park Century School Art Program is the idea that every child is an artist. Lower School students come to embrace their artistic selves through an Art Program that includes play and experimentation, values process over product, and allows students to choose what they want to make art about. The Lower School art program is heavily influenced by the Teaching for Artistic Behavior (TAB) model, a choice-based approach to art education that enables students to develop artistic habits through authentic learning experiences and responsive teaching. Choice-based art education offers students real choices for responding to their own ideas and interests through the making of art. The results are inspiring and lead to the creation of artworks that are truly unique to the spirit of each child! When Lower School students walk into the PCS art studio, they can pick from a number of different art centers to bring their ideas to life. The foundational art centers available year-round include Drawing, Painting, Collage, and Sculpture.

As the school year unfolds and students become more independent, more centers are made available to them such as Fiber Arts,

Printmaking, Stop Motion Animation, and
Jewelry Making. Students organize their

work and track their progress by keeping a portfolio of their artwork. Student art portfolios are filled with experimental works, practice drawings, sculpture maquettes, and finished works of art destined for display in our schoolwide art shows. Students write artist statements to accompany their artwork

and they practice speaking about their artworks during our "art openings," which feature celebratory snacks and sparkling apple cider! Some popular themes and trends that appeared in this year's exhibitions included: optical illusions, mermaids, unicorns, Stranger Things fan art, and Boxwars wearable sculptures.

The Capshaw-Spielberg Upper School Art Program continues to develop artistic behaviors in students through a focus on the Studio Habits of Artist, which include Develop Craft, Engage & Persist, Envision, Express, Observe, Reflect, Stretch & Explore, and Understanding Art Worlds. The Studio Habits of Artists are the dispositions that students must practice in order to develop their artistic minds. Upper School students practice the Studio Habits of Artists via a series of artistic "boot camps" (both 2D and 3D) throughout the school year. These boot camps provide foundational skill sets that prepare students for working on independent projects in the latter part of the school year. Boot camps are also highly collaborative and incorporate students working in teams to complete a variety of creative exercises. In the fall, we kicked off the school year with an intensive drawing boot camp that covered observational drawing skills including still-life drawing and urban sketching. In the spring, students engaged in sculpture boot camp focused on wearable/functional art. Students made custom shoes, helmets, and eccentric masks. In the Upper School, all projects incorporate a reflection component. Students engage in critiques, write artists statements, and proudly display their work for the school community.





Music

This year, students continued their musical education using fundamentals based on the Orff Schulwerk method. This method of teaching integrates music, movement, speech, and drama in an effort to build musicianship in every style of learner. This method proves to be an accessible way to

learn music without the frustration of the classical pedagogy by allowing children to begin with what they do instinctively: play! Through imitation, experimentation, and personal expression, each student explores music at their pace and builds confidence by learning rhythms and melodies from around the globe. Our students had two wonderful performances this year- one during the

holidays for our parents and community, and another during Grandparents and Special Friends Day in the spring, where the progress that the students had made during the year was self-evident. Our music classes create a culture at Park Century where students are excited to become life-long musicians, and encourage each other to share their musical ideas and talents.









Athletics

The athletics program at Park Century kicked off in the fall this year with 5th/6th grade flag football, and 6th-8th grade girls volleyball. Both teams represented a solid percentage of student participation; so many of our students enjoy being a part of our team sports. The 5th/6th grade flag football team wrapped up the season with 7 games completed, while the 6th-8th grade girls volleyball team has a solid season and finished the year with a 5-4 record.

The winter athletic season saw an enormous amount of interest in basketball- so many students wanted to play that we had 3 different teams! We had a 5th/6th grade boys team, a 7th/8th grade girls team and a 7th/8th grade boys team. The 5th/6th grade team finished with an impressive winning record, having triumphed over many competitive teams from much larger schools. Both the boys and girls 7th/8th grade teams participated in the Foundation for Interscholastic Youth Athletics (FIYA) League and had successful and enjoyable seasons.

In the spring, our 5th/6th grade co-ed soccer team competed valiantly! They had an impressive turn out with 11 boys and girls participating, developing a love of the sport as well as embracing the importance of hard work and playing as a team.

We continue to expand our Panther athletics program every year by adding additional sports teams to meet increased participation and strengthening the collaboration with other schools in our network to build an athletic environment that supports our diverse community.




































The objective of the science program is to provide many opportunities for students to practice scientific inquiry. Students start out in the youngest grades with a program called Mystery Science. They walk through the processes of observation, experimentation and reflection through videos, class discussion and hands-on practice. As they move into the upper school, natural curiosity is passionately encouraged, but experimentation becomes more formalized with laboratory procedures and recording and analyzing data. All students develop their interest in the natural world and scientific phenomena. Students graduate with fond memories of hands-on science experiments, a grasp of current events and scientific discoveries, and an excitement about entering into future science classes and careers, with a critical mind and an ethical approach.

The science lab is continually stocked with the latest tools and technology to provide students with relevant experiences that make learning come alive. Each year, the different classes rotate through important themes in science so that upon completion of the program, students have surveyed many interesting topics in

physics, biology, chemistry, earth science, coding and robotics, and engineering.

All of the classes participated in an ageappropriate dissection week. The youngest students hunted for rodent skulls and other bones inside barn owl pellets. They looked at the beautiful compound eye of the giant grasshopper under a microscope. Middle grade students dissected a squid and used the ink inside the ink sack to write their names on their lab notes. They removed the lens from a cow eyeball to observe how images get flipped as they reflect on the retina, just like they do in a human eye. The upper school students dissected a pig heart and traced the path of the blood through the 4 chambers. Finally, to correspond with their learning and the brain unit, 8th grade students dissected a sheep brain and compared it to a human brain, noticing the amazing similarities.

Another favorite week of science that all students participate in is the coding and robotics week. Projects range from interactive installations in the science lab, color sorting machines, marine biology video games, and a robotic petting zoo. The science lab is a place where students

and teachers ask lots of questions and work together to solve problems. It is easy to see the relevance of math, engineering, persuasive writing, careful reading and communication when you study such fascinating topics as space exploration, alternative energy sources, and genetic engineering. We learn a lot about ourselves and how our experience fits in to a global perspective through modeling, experimenting, observing and technology. The science lab is the place for fun and experiential learning.





Library

Our new school librarian worked hard this year to expose students to a variety of fiction and nonfiction books about wide-ranging topics: Black History, Women's History, poetry, horror and mysteries, colonial and westward movement stories, classics of King Arthur, and so much more. The students participated in so many engaging projects, from constructing poetry based on 6-8 random words to making their own comic strips based on the principles of Social Emotional Learning. They even practiced and presented a Dr. Seuss play at a morning assembly! Our highly successful Book Fair this year was themed after the popular children's Minecraft franchise and featured one of our parent authors, Max Brooks, as well as so many of our wonderful parent volunteers. The library has established itself as one of our students' favorite places on campus and will continue to be a welcoming place where students can gather and feel comfortable reading and enjoying literature of all kinds.





Super Shop

In Super Shop this year, the possibilities were endless, and the only confines were the limits of the imagination! Projects in this class were created to coincide and reinforce topics from each class' social studies unit. This year, SuperShop saw an incredible diversity of curriculum-based projects, including building replicas of Pharaoh Kufu's boat, making detailed relief maps of their countries of origin, and even creating life-sized sets for a school-wide play at the end of the year. Super Shop reinforces group collaboration as well as individual fine motor skills, executive functioning, and processing.



Panther Packs

Panther Packs meet once a month and are comprised of students from each grade level. By participating in Panther Packs, Park Century students build a sense of school community through targeting character education and service-learning. Each month in Panther Packs, we focused on one of the 6 character traits of the "Panther Way:" Kindness, Respect, Responsibility, Cooperation, Honesty, and Resilience, and paired that character trait with a service-learning project that served the greater community. The Panther Way furthers the sense of community by creating a common language between home and school, as we encourage parents to incorporate the language of these core traits at home as well.

















Advisory

Our Advisory groups serve as a community within a community for our 7th and 8th grade students. Advisory seeks to promote growth in ways that transcend the classroom, and foster a sense of personal and social responsibility, good decision making, resilience, strong understanding of our core values, and personal success. Students are assigned a Faculty Advisor and assemble in small groups once a week. The Faculty Advisor provides a warm, supportive, and comfortable environment and also serves as a mentor throughout the school year.

An important component of Advisory is the service-learning partnership. Our 7th grade students partner with Heal the Bay, and our 8th grade students partner with the Westside Children's Center. During the 2017-2018 school year, our 7th grade students adopted "Toes Beach" in Playa Del Rey, which included three visits to clean the beach during the school year. Our 8th grade students made four visits to the preschool at the Westside Children's Center to work with students from underserved communities.
